Vale of Grwyney Community Council

Introduction

The Vale of Grwyney Community Council is a small community council situated within the Brecon Beacons National Park. It represents a small rural community consisting of three villages and a scattered rural hinterland with a total population of approximately 700. The Council consists of 9 Councillors and employs a part-time Clerk

The Council is custodial trustee of Glangrwyney Village Hall, but has no tangible assets. It does not own any premises or green spaces, but does lease a small area of ground in Llanbedr which is being used to create a nature garden and community orchard. It aims to promote sustainability and biodiversity by pursuing sustainability goals and sustainable practices wherever possible.

The Council has been instrumental in the creation of community allotments and has created a "Queen Elizabeth II Platinum Jubilee Walk" to commemorate Her Late Majesty's reign by planting seven trees at strategic points throughout the Vale of Grwyney, each tree represents one decade of Her Late Majesty's 70 year reign. Seventy bulbs have also been planted in each of the three main villages.

The Council actively promotes applications from community groups to fund sustainable projects which enhance the environment and benefit its residents.

The precept for 2024/25 was £11,000.
